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## Message from the Board Chairs Keri Bristow, Chair & Ben Ford, Vice Chair

In 2023, the work of the Mountain Views School District Board was focused on several key steps to **enhance teaching and learning** in our schools.

Continuing to leverage pandemic-era ESSR funds to overcome learning loss, the district made key investments in math and reading education this year. Our math teachers created foundational agreements to advance teaching practices, engagement, high-quality instructional resources, and learning assessments. Student literacy based on the science of reading culminated in a new 90% reading proficiency standard for the district. This represents an ambitious goal and our educators have eagerly learned new methods and and have seen exciting early results.


The Board also approved **additional administrative and education resources** at our elementary schools to address socio-emotional behavioral concerns using restorative approaches.

Thanks to voter approval, a \$1.75M project was completed to replace the roof at Killington Elementary. A \$1.2M upgrade project was required to extend the service life of the heating system at Woodstock Union High School after losing the use of 6 classrooms last winter.

We are thankful for the commitment of fellow Board members, and of our exceptional administrators, educators, and school staff. Through all of our collective dedication to the students of our district, we have made real progress in overcoming the challenges presented by the pandemic, as well as tackling infrastructure issues long in the making. We look forward to continuing our important work together in the year to come.





2023 was the first year VTCAP (Cognia) was administered. This is the first year of a three year average. Comparisons to other schools in Vermont or the statewide averages are still embargoed by the AOE.

# Superintendent Recommendations and Considerations

This is the fourth Annual Report submitted to the Board for consideration from the Superintendent.

### **Student Outcomes:**

It is important to note that last spring was the first time that Cognia or VT CAP was given in Vermont. Data was not available for comparison with other Vermont Schools. Patterns of strength and challenges were observed across schools with Barnard performing above District averages in both Math and ELA. A second year of data from this spring's assessments will be valuable for further comparisons.



# Superintendent Recommendations and Considerations

### Financial:

The Campus Sustainability Policy requires a comparison of the average of our five elementary per-pupil costs. Based on this year's costs, the average per-pupil cost is \$20,730. The Policy states that based on a three year average, an elementary per-pupil cost should not exceed 120% of that number. For this year, 120% of the per-pupil cost is \$24,876. The previous year's average per-pupil cost was \$17,351; 120% of that number is \$20,821, and the year prior to that was \$13,563; 120% of that number is \$16,275. The three year average is \$21,350. All elementary schools, except for Reading Elementary School (\$26,735), are below this number.



## Superintendent Recommendations and Considerations

### **Enrollment:**

While overall enrollment in the District has remained consistent, data shows that growth is occurring in the elementary grades and at grade nine. There continues to be variability from year to year with the greatest growth in our Pre K programs and ninth grade.



Superintendent Recommendations and Considerations regarding Campus Sustainability

The MVSU Sustainability Policy requires the Superintendent to make a recommendation regarding the sustainability of each of our campuses based on enrollment, student outcomes and costs, as well as their alignment with the current Strategic Plan. All of our campuses are maintaining their enrollment, and based on one year of State data, there is some variability in student outcomes. Comparison to this spring's data will allow for greater insights. While Reading's per student costs exceed the District average for a second year, I believe that RES allows all of our elementary classrooms to maintain a healthy class size that provides the greatest opportunities for positive student outcomes. I recommend no action be taken at this time.
